## TRITT FAMILY HISTORY: PUBLICATION PLANS

Because of the large span of time to be covered and the large amount of data already available, members of the research committee have decided to publish the TRITT FAMILY HISTORY in multiple volumes. At the 1994 meeting of TFR, the decision was made to focus separate volumes in the following way:

Volume I. This volume will cover the ancestry, life and times of the brothers Hans Peter Tritt and Christian Tritt, immigrants to Pennsylvania in 1739. Presented in this volume will be stories, legends and a capsule history of the Obersimmental from earliest recorded times up to the late 17th century, the period when the major emigrations began. In terms of genealogical information, this volume will start with the date 1562, the earliest recorded date of an ancestor, trace this lineage to Hans Peter and Christian, give an account of their migration out of Switzerland and their residence in Alsace, and portray their arrival and settlement in Pennsylvania. This volume will also discuss the etymology of the Tritten-Tritt name and give an account of the name variations which have occurred following emigration out of Switzerland. This volume will end after giving an account of the firstborn generation in America, i.e., the children of Hans Peter Tritt and Christian Tritt.

Completed drafts of this initial volume are now being circulated to members of the review committee. Revised drafts will be presented at an editorial conference scheduled for May 11-16, 1995, in

Carlisle, Pennsylvania. It is our hope to begin distribution of Volume I by the summer of 1996 meeting of TFR.

Focus of the subsequent volumes will be, as follows:

Volume II. This volume will cover the children of Hans Peter Tritt and Christian Tritt and their descendants down to the current day. It is in this volume that we will include the many accounts which have been written and submitted over the past several years. To guide your efforts in this regard, refer to the article in this and previous newsletters titled "Write the Story of an Ancestor" and "Family Group Record Sheets". In addition, please feel free to write or call any one of the officers of TFR. Although we have not set a timetable for the publication of Volume II, it is our hope to begin reviewing submitted drafts during 1996.

Volume III. This volume will give the story of immigrants other than Hans Peter and Christian to America. The intent is to trace the ancestry of each of these immigrants back to 1562 and present the descendants of each of these immigrants up to the current day.

Volume IV. The focus of this volume will be to portray the pre-1900 story of European TRITTEN, TRITT and DRITT. An attempt will be made to present all intra-European migrations and settlements and list all lines back to 1562.

Volume V. This volume will present the story of emigrants to places other than Europe and America.

## REMEMBER WHEN?

The following article first appeared in the Beckley, West Virginia Post Herald newspaper on February 19, 1946. It was submitted to us by Lorene Tritt Wagner of Johnson City, Tennessee:

Probably no one living remembers "Uncle Henry" Tritt, the noted lawyer who traveled about Fayettee and Greenbrier Counties on an ox a hundred years ago. "Uncle Henry" was a great character -- and we are happy to bring him to the attention of Post-Herald readers. His story is related by Mrs. Laura M. Blake Kincaid.

The progenitor of the Tritt family came from Holland, first to Pennsylvania. Two sons fought throughout the Revolutionary War. The original name was Trate but was anglicized to Tritt.

One of the sons of the above family, Peter Tritt, removed from Pennsylvania soon after the war of the Revolution to Lee County, Virginia, where he purchased a farm. Here in 1809 a daughter, Mary Magdeline (Polly) was united in marriage to James Galespie Kincaid, a son of John and Ann Graham Kincaid, who had previously lived on Roaring River in Tennessee. James Galespie Kincaid bought land in Lee County, Virginia, but being one with itching feet, started on the westward trek and in 1831 ended up on Lower Loup Creek.

Three of Mrs. Kincaid's brothers visited her and all three married in Fayettee and Kanawha Counties.

The one which we will now mention was the oldest brother, Henry. Although of not such great stature he was a giant in strength. He spent much time with his sister, often staying for months at a time.

A word picture given of him was a man about five feet, seven inches in height, broad shoulders, very erect, dark auburn hair (almost red), blue eyes, ruddy complexion and very glib of speech. He had many friends, despite his peculiar disposition. He

had a splendid education and was a lawyer by profession, practicing in Fayettee and Greenbrier Counties. He was said to be one of the shrewdest lawyers of either county. When pleading a case he put aside this peculiar disposition and went into the case determined to win, which he usually did.

In dress he was neat; he always wore a white shirt but absolutely refused to wear a collar and always went bare headed. In traveling he sometimes walked but usually rode an ox, bearing bridle, saddle and very gay rigging for an ox.

When leaving his sister's home to go to Greenbrier, and whether riding or walking, he had a certain distance to go, always stopping at the same place for the night. The first day was to a point near Cotton Hill, where he spent the night at the home of a Mr. Wilson (father of Uncle Nathan Wilson). The next day he would travel as far as the home of a Mr. Hutchinson near Meadow Bridge, the place now known as Magnet. The next day he would go on in to Lewisburg where he had most of his law practice.

He was especially liked by children and could always win the friendship of a child. William Settle, an early settlor of Loup Creek, his father's home being at what is now known as the Jack Kelly place said, "The most pleasant memory of my childhood was getting to ride with Uncle Henry on his ox."

He was married twice, and shortly after he married the second time, his wife asked him one day to bring her a load of wood. He put on his coat, walked out the door and was gone seven months. When he returned he came in at the door with a load of wood, saying, "Here is your wood, my dear."

At one time he had a law case in Greenbrier, in which he made one of the opposing side very angry. The day after this trial the offended man called at Mr. Tritt's home and asked to see him. Tritt came out of the house and the angry man said, "I have come to whip you for what you said in court yesterday."

While Mr. Tritt was not afraid to engage in battle with the angry man, he did not wish to engage in a fight and did what he could to excuse himself from such, but the man persisted that he had come to whip him and that he would do so before leaving, whereupon Mr. Tritt said, "I was just beginning my dinner when you called me. Will you grant me time to finish?" The visitor said very sullenly, "Yes." Mr. Tritt turned to his son and said, "Son, bring me the half bushel of oats." The boy stepped back into the house and returned with a half bushel of oats and placed them in the doorway near Mr. Tritt who stooped and began eating the oats after the manner of a horse eating. The angry man stood and looked at him as if very astonished but without saying a word, presently began backing away, then turned and walked quickly out of sight. He never returned to take up the argument.

When going to the mill for his sister while on Loup Creek, he would sometimes walk and sometimes ride the ox, but would carry the bag of corn on his back when riding. On being asked the reason for this, he replied, "I do this to keep the ox from getting so tired."

He was a great conversationalist and would stand and talk as long as anyone would talk to him. On one occasion, Preston Kincaid and Robert Ingram were by the roadside and saw Mr. Tritt coming with a two-bushel bag of corn on his shoulders. Preston said, "Robert, let's see how long Uncle Henry will stand with that corn on his shoulders."

Mr. Tritt came up, placed his foot on the log on which they were sitting and began talking. After standing there for quite awhile, Robert said, "Isn't your load pretty heavy on your shoulders?"

Mr. Tritt said, "Begorra" (a favorite byword of his), "I have a sack on my shoulders! I'd forgotten I had it."

The older people of the community often told us stories of "Uncle Henry". In correspondence with a great-great-granddaughter of Henry Tritt, she related many amusing incidents concerning him.

"James is the son of my half-brother, David Arwell Tritt and Thelma Carrier Tritt. He was lost at sea in the Bay of Tonkin, July 7, 1967. His ancestry goes back to Hans Peter Tritt and his second wife Anna Maria Barbara Dellinger via Paul Tritt and Elizabeth Becker, Peter Tritt and Esther Suess, Joshua Tritt and Rachael Deselom, Joseph Tritt and Mary Varner, Arwell Tritt and Sadie Reno, who were James' grandparents . . . [James'] older brother David Elmer Tritt lives in Darlington, Pennsylvania, and his younger sister Betty Jean Tritt Schenk lives in Bremerton, Washington."

## FAMILY GROUP RECORD SHEETS

If you want information regarding yourself and your family included in the eventual publication of Tritt Family History, we ask that you complete a series of Family Group Record Sheets. This sheet is the standard form for the initial recording of all genealogical information. For your use, we have included a copy of this form in this issue of the Newsletter. Since you will probably need several such sheets, you might copy the one included here. One sheet is to be completed for each family, i.e., each marriage unit. If there is a second marriage, then a second sheet is to be completed.

Ordinarily, three completed Family Group Record Sheets, one each for A) you (and all your children), B) your parents (and all their children), and C) your Tritt grandparents (and all their children) in combination with our own considerable collection of pre-20th century sheets could result in the delineation of your own multi-generational pedigree chart, perhaps as far back as the 1500s. Should you be able to provide an additional sheet containing information about your Tritt great-grandparents (and all their children), the likelihood is increased of being able to provide you with such a lengthy pedigree chart. Without these sheets, the linkages cannot be made and information is not readily available for future generations.

In listing all dates, please be sure to use the convention of day/month (in words)/full year, e.g., 18 July 1876. In addition, please be sure to give maiden names of all females. Both of these practices help to eliminate many errors. Send your completed Family Group Record Sheets to Donald G. To indicate that a child is an ancestor of the family representative, place an "X" behind the number pertaining to that child.

## NEXT WORLDWIDE FAMILY REUNION

(Note Change of Date)

Our next International Family Reunion will be held in Lenk, Switzerland, the summer of 1997.

KURT and FRANCES TRITTEN of Vich/Vaud and Lenk have graciously volunteered to coordinate plans for the next worldwide reunion of TRITTEN-TRITT-DRITT-TRAIT.

Projected 1997 Reunion plans include the following:

An Initial Long Weekend (3 days). Possible events could include: Sign-in, Introductions, Photographs, A Welcoming Event, Meeting and mingling with others; Presentation of Family Information, Papers, Films, History, Legends, Etc.; A Guided Walk around the village; A Walk together in the mountains; A visit and Church Service at St. Stephan; A viewing of Early Records; Musical Programs; Informational Programs about St. Stephan, Lenk and the Obersimmental; visits with the Elder Tritten of the area; and similar events.

Residence in an Obersimmental Chalet (10 days). In a pattern somewhat different than previous visitations to Switzerland, members identified a preference for becoming better acquainted with the life and places of the Obersimmental by renting several chalets in the Lenk/St. Stephan area and residing here. From this location people could choose to explore nearby areas or plans could be made by the sub-groups to take day trips by bus or train to places more distant. Such a flexible plan could accommodate the needs of those who prefer staying in one place as well as those who want to explore outside the Obersimmental. Since areas are, at most, only a few hours away, a wide variety of places could be explored in keeping with one's own preferences.

\$1,369.50 was the total of donations to TFR of which \$260 was designated for the 16th Century Research Fund. This \$260 added to the \$901.50 previously reported brings this fund total to \$1,161.50. This amount is included in the current account balance of \$2,632.64 shown above.

As is always the case, the largest expense is for producing and mailing the annual TFR newsletter. This year, that amount totals \$1,642.56 or approximately \$1.10 for each copy produced. Comparing this total with the \$1,790.58 total income noted above, it becomes obvious that nearly all income is consumed in providing the annual newsletter. Given this situation, it would appear that only a few of our newsletter recipients are interested in TFR or its goal of publishing a family history. I think you will agree that something must be done if goals are to be achieved.

I suggest two possible solutions. One solution is to reduce the cost of producing the newsletter. Cheaper paper can be used and perhaps other savings can be identified that might help reduce the cost of production. You have our pledge that we will review the process and do all that we can to reduce this cost.

The other possible solution is to get more of our readership involved. This not only means providing funding but your help in making the newsletter more interesting to read. We need for you to provide articles and photographs, histories and otherwise. Who knows, you might supply information that others are searching for. So do what you can to help.

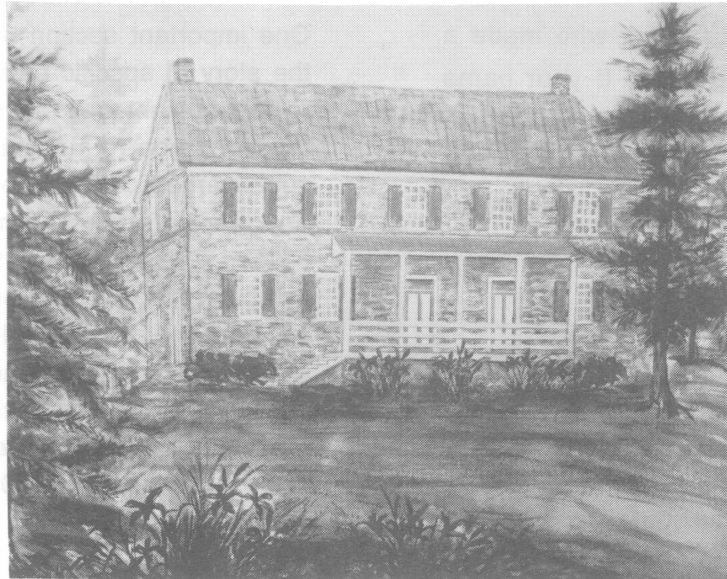

## THE STORY OF THE DRITT HOUSE PAINTING

W. Wayne Tritt

The beautiful stone house depicted in the painting above was built in 1758 by Hans Peter Tritt and is located at Long Level, a riverside settlement four miles south of Wrightsville, York County, Pennsylvania, along the Susquehanna River. It is the first known Tritt home built in America.

About three or four years ago, Marjorie (Tritt) Lehman wrote to me indicating her wish to do a watercolor of this beautiful stone edifice. She asked to borrow any photos or snapshots that might aid her, along with her research and sketches, in producing the watercolor. I responded by sending all the photos in my possession that I thought might be helpful. Months later, the photos were returned along with a note of thanks. In May of 1994, I received from Marjorie a Polaroid photo of the finished painting. I was so excited when I saw how the artist was able to convey the details and colors in such a grand manner. In my view, this painting is a good likeness of the subject and portrays in a magnificent way what this house may have appeared around the time it was erected.

But back to the Polaroid. It occurred to me that there may be people who would be interested in acquiring

copies of this fine work so I inquired of Marjorie if she would permit copying. Without hesitation she granted TFR the sole rights to copy and distribute this 8" x 10" watercolor which is in full color and suitable for framing. This work has been copyrighted so that reproducing this painting in any form is illegal.

So many thanks to Marjorie (Tritt) Lehman for allowing Tritt Family Research to copy and distribute this lovely rendition of the first Tritt home built in America.

By licensing TFR to copy and distribute this work, Marjorie hopes (and so do I) that many of you would purchase same and in so doing help to raise funds toward publishing the first volume of history of the Tritt family and at the same time acquire a visual symbol of your family heritage.
